Before breakfast is over, make sure to tell the rest of the family that

- Lord Swinepuddle, the son of Viscount Fopsworth, has accepted our invitation and will be coming to dinner next week.
- This is excellent news, if we play our cards right he may ask for Florence's hand then and there.

You receive a letter from Mrs Cooper, accepting your invitation to luncheon today.

Letter to Florence from Robert

You receive a note from Robert, your lover in the village. He writes that if you are certain you want him, he will gladly come to the manor to ask your father for your hand. He can get away from the farm mid-morning and will be at the manor at ten o'clock.

Before breakfast is over, ask your father

- to meet you in the study at ten o'clock because you have something important to discuss

Letter to Uncle Henry from Helen

You receive a letter from your daughter Helen, who writes that she can't wait any longer - she needs an answer about the wedding. Will cousin George help her or not? She will arrive with the two o'clock train to Upper Hepplethorpe. Will he make sure that she is welcome for tea so that they can talk to cousin George together?

Before breakfast is over, make sure to tell the rest of the family that

- My daughter is in the area and will be coming for a visit today. Shall I ask her to join us for afternoon tea?

Letter to Mr Jenkins from Mr Butcher

This letter to you has been mixed up with the family's post by mistake and you really shouldn't read it here, but you do so anyway. You try to read the letter without the family noticing.

Instructions for DI Bell

Scene 9: Interviews

The suspects sit waiting for you to start the interviews. Let them play the scene for a few moments, then ask them one by one to come into another room to be interviewed. The characters will not overhear the interviews, but the players will see and hear them. They will be able to talk quietly to each other while you conduct the interviews.

Interview with Lady Hepplethorpe

- When did you last see Lord Hepplethorpe?
- What did you do after that?
- Tell me about your day what did you and Lord Hepplethorpe do?

PC Plod enters the room and hands DI Bell a kitchen knife that was found near the body.

- Do you recognise this knife?
 - Yes: when did you last see it?
 - No: ask PC Plod to show it to the cook
- Did Lord Hepplethorpe have any enemies?
- Do you know of any reason that someone would want to harm him?

Interview with Miss Florence Hepplethorpe

- When did you last see Lord Hepplethorpe?
- What did you do after that?
- What did Lord Hepplethorpe do today? Did you see him during the day?

PC Plod enters the room and hands DI Bell a bottle of pesticide that was found near the body.

- Do you recognise this bottle?
 - Yes: when did you last see it?
 - No: ask PC Plod to show it to the gardener
- You had a young man visiting today, did you not? What did Lord Hepplethorpe think of your association with him?
- Did Lord Hepplethorpe have any enemies that you know of?
- Do you know of any reason that someone would want to harm him?

Interview with Uncle Henry

- When did you last see Lord Hepplethorpe?
- What did you do after that?
- What did you do today? Did you spend any time with Lord Hepplethorpe?

PC Plod enters the room and hands DI Bell a shotgun that was found near the body.

- Do you recognise this shotgun?
 - Yes: when did you last see it?
 - No: ask PC Plod to show it to the footman

- I understand your daughter is getting married. Was Lord Hepplethorpe going to help finance the wedding?
- Did Lord Hepplethorpe have any enemies?
- Do you know of any reason that someone would want to harm him?

Interview with Mr Jenkins

- When did you last see Lord Hepplethorpe?
- What did you do after that?
- What happened during the day? Were there any visitors?

PC Plod enters the room and hands DI Bell a candle stick that was found near the body.

- Do you recognise this candle stick?
 - Yes: when did you last see it?
 - No: ask PC Plod to show it to the housekeeper

Ask a few more questions, for example:

- How long have you worked for Lord Hepplethorpe?
- Do you know of any reason that someone would want to harm him?

Scene 10: Detective Inspector Bell reveals who did it

DI Bell gathers everyone in the drawing room. He says that this has been a most interesting crime but that he has now discovered who the murderer is.

He tells the story of what happened from the time when everyone met in the hall to when Lord Hepplethorpe died. The other players react to his story as he is telling it.

When he reveals the murderer, this becomes the truth and all players adjust their reactions accordingly.

When the identity of the murderer is revealed and the players have reacted to it, the scenario is over.
